## **Program:**

Charlie Clark introduced today speaker, Johnny O'Shea, the Platteville Postmaster. John started by letting us know his parents named him Johnny to ensure he was recognized as being of Irish decent. We agreed it was quite obvious. In 1984, John started his career in Park Ridge IL., sorting the mail. Of course, this is all done through automation today. He told us that having learned the manual system of the postal system was very beneficial in grasping the automation as it developed.

Having worked in a larger post office, John soon knew this wasn't where he wanted to



be. Raising two small children, he wanted to relocate from the Chicago area. He enjoyed the smaller operations and was able to get a position in the East Dubuque Post Office. In 2009, that office was combined with Galena. The Platteville position became available and John was hired for the position. Consolidation of many smaller offices has been a struggle as mail is now routed to large facilities for sorting to various routes. Our mail currently goes to Milwaukee before being returned to Platteville for delivery.

In 1776, Benjamin Franklin was part of the beginning of the Postal Service as we know it today. It has advanced considerably since then, up through Pony Express days, to automobiles, automation, and today, with electronic scanners, computers, and the internet. Although mail volume may have decreased with all the electronic communication, the postal service has seen an increase in parcel packages. In December of this year they delivered Amazon shipments on Sunday during the holidays.

John commended the Platteville employees as some of the best he has worked with. They take pride in their work. They definitely do not like making mistakes. Bob Stephens has been with the Post Office for 38 years and John said stability like that is what helps our office run smoothly.
